AIWC MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS FOR LOCALS / KAZAKHS


Local/Kazakh people can only become a member, if:

2) You have lived, or studied in another country (countries) for at least one year.


3) You have been recommended by two Expat members of the Club.

I studied Economics at the university and though I have never worked as economist, but it helped me in my career in Human Resources. I love working with people, resolving problems, helping to find the better solutions. It makes me really happy when I know I can support the team around me and at the same time learn from them. While working in HR department of Carrefour Hypermarket in Iran, I have met my dear future husband. We got engaged in 2012 and after 6 months when we have already decided to marry he has been transferred to Yerevan, Armenia . In 2013 I had to resign and joined him there. Majority of population are Muslims, but Iran is a country of diversity combining different religions, cultures and languages.

News from the Charity Committee

AIWC has committed to sponsor a project of the charity fund Mercy run by A. Sain a series of TV shootings for a TV programme featuring orphans and children left outside of parental care "Kazakhstan without orphans". The programme is aimed to promote the idea that orphans and children left outside of parental care should be in a family (adoption/foster care/ guardianship).

In fact, in Kazakhstan the waiting list of parents willing to adopt is far greater than the number of kids in orphanages.

Inclusion of a child in the database for orphans and children left outside of parental care on the portal www.usynovite.kz gives a good chance for him/ her to be adopted. The main problem is an attempt to look for a child to adopt - scarce information about kids - age, traits, etc. No one really knows how a family which prepares to adopt understands he/she is "their child". Adoptive parents usually describe that something "flinches" when they found out about a particular child.

So, a possibility to get to know the child before an actual meeting, increases the child's chances to be in "his/her family". The main idea of the TV programme: the audience is given a 10 minutes' video profile with the child's story as the voice over and a short lively interview from which viewers learn about the child's character, virtues and shortcomings, as well as what they like and dislike.



Babushka Basket

Soon it will the time again for one of our most regular and favourite charity projects - "Babushka Basket". We help elderly people of Almaty who are in urgent need; they have very limited income, physical or mental disabilities, and are often socially isolated requiring assistance with basic needs.

We are asking all members and their friends to help pack around 100 baskets and assist with the delivery of them to Babushkas. So let's come together for a good cause! Not only will you be helping someone in need, but you may even make a new friend!

The specific volunteer duties will be to pack the baskets and deliver them later (same day or next day) directly to Babushkas' address. The delivery lists usually are arranged by the city districts allowing to you to complete delivery in short time.

The average price of the basket is 5000 tenge. We welcome everybody to donate and to buy their own basket/baskets for this small amount which will make a big difference to somebody in need.

On May 16, 2017 we invite all volunteers - for packing and delivery on May 16-18 the grocery baskets to the Babushkas or Dedushkas. The location will be announced later.

The "Hope Garden" at Seven Trees is an ongoing project that started in the summer of 2014, when my friend Olenka Rug came to visit from the UK. Ola has worked for many years with diverse groups in London, helping people learn to grow plants as a way to develop healthier lifestyles and to engage communities. Prison programs around the world have supported gardening for inmates as a way of becoming more sustainable, teaching life skills, creating a sense of self-worth and sanctuary, increasing empathy and for rehabilitation.

These ideals were considered in the original design and development of the Seven Trees gardening project. The vision of the Seven Trees garden was to create an oasis that would be both healing and a food supply for the staff and clients who work and live at the half-way house. Since gardening is a never-ending process, there was still a small patch of land at Seven Trees that needed attention. On April 1st, seven volunteers gathered to work in making the front garden into a welcoming and friendly place.

Lead by world traveller and AIS teacher Alex Eton and his team from the "Mongolia Nonstop: Limitless Adventure Road Trip Expedition", the group were soon hard at work, moving tree trunks, moving rocks and paving stones, digging up trees and turning the soil. It was a hard day of work, with short breaks for tea and a home-cooked lunch provided by the Seven Trees ladies. At the end of the day, the garden structure was created, with a pathway, hills mimicking the steppes, and native trees planted. Now the Garden of Hope just awaits the planting of flowers and other drought-resistant plants plus a bench for contemplation and good neighbourhood gossip!

A special thank you to Alex Eaton and his team, Zhanel Mussakhanova, Alisher Abdiyev, Aydin and Dulat Zhumabekov, Aiganym Shinaliyeva, plus my friend Dasha Bityuskaya, who all gave their time willingly and with good humour.

FOOD Greek Moussaka

Ingredients:

•3 eggplants, peeled and cut lengthwise into 1/2 inch thick slices

- Salt
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 pound lean ground beef
- salt to taste
- ground black pepper to taste
- 2 onions, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon fines herbs 2 tablespoons dried parsley
- 1 (8 ounce) can tomato paste
 1/2 cup red wine
- 1 egg, beaten
- 4 cups milk
- 1/2 cup butter
- 6 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- salt to taste
- ground white pepper, to taste

• 1 1/2 cups freshly grated Parmesan cheese • 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg





Process

Cooking stats • Prep 45 min • Cook -1h Ready In 1h 45 m

• Lay the slices of eggplant on paper towels, sprinkle lightly with salt, and set aside for 30 minutes to draw out the moisture. Then in a skillet over high heat, heat the olive oil. Quickly fry the eggplant until browned. Set aside on paper towels to drain.

. • In a large skillet over medium heat, melt the butter and add the ground beef, salt and pepper to taste, onions, and garlic. After the beef is browned, sprinkle in the cinnamon, nutmeg, fines herbs and parsley. Pour in the tomato sauce and wine, and mix well. Simmer for 20 minutes. Allow to cool, and then stir in beaten egg.

. • To make the bechamel sauce, begin by scalding the milk in a saucepan. Melt the butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Whisk in flour until smooth. Lower heat; gradually pour in the hot milk, whisking constantly until it thickens. Season with salt, and white pepper.

. • Arrange a layer of eggplant in a greased 9x13 inch baking dish. Cover eggplant with all of the meat mixture, and then sprinkle 1/2 cup of Parmesan cheese over the meat. Cover with remaining eggplant, and sprinkle another 1/2 cup of cheese on top. Pour the bechamel sauce over the top, and sprinkle with the nutmeg. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese.

. • Bake for 1 hour at 350 degrees



TRADITION The Victory Day celebration

The annual celebrations of the Victory Day will be taking place on the 9th of May. The holiday is dedicated to remembering the victory of the Soviet Union over Nazi Germany in 1945 in the Great Patriotic War as WWII is known in the former Soviet states. The surrender documents were signed late in the night on 8 May 1945. it was already May 9 Moscow time. Celebrating this day has become a tradition in Kazakhstan.

During the War, along with all other 15 Soviet republics, the Kazakh Soviet Republic was wholeheartedly engaged in the war effort. More than 1 million 200 thousand soldiers were mobilized from the republic. They formed 12 rifle and 4 cavalry divisions, 7 rifle brigades, and about 50 separate regiments and battalions. In the beginning of the War the Soviets suffered defeat after defeat. The loss of lives reached millions. In this situation, the Kazakhstanis were sent to the most dangerous parts of the front line.

The first major victory for the Soviets was the pushback of the German forces in the defense of Moscow. Panfilov's Men took part in the defense of Moscow at the critical point of the World War II. The bravery of the Panfilov division is remembered far beyond Kazakhstan and one of its officers' words became legendary. He was a political officer named Klochkov who declared: "Russia is great, yet there is nowhere to retreat -Moscow is behind us!" His words resonated all across the Soviet Union. The beautiful park with cathedral in the center of Almaty is named after the Panfilov division. And the powerful monument is dedicated to those heroes.

Other well known heroes of WWII from Kazakhstan are - Baurzhan Momyshuly, Talgat Bigeldinov and many more. Two Kazakh girls became famous in the Soviet Union. They are commonly known as Alia and Manshuk. Every family in Kazakhstan lost someone in this war, parents or grandparents. Their acts of bravery stopped the most terrible war in history. Victory Day on May 9th will always mean a lot for Kazakhstan people. In memory of this day thousands of citizens come to Panfilov park to the monument to celebrate it and to recall all lost soldiers.

Now, as I looked out, it felt gloomy and dreary. I grumbled and complained to all who cared to listen. Where oh where was the sun?

"Mom!! Come quick! Look at this!" is the frantic shout I hear. I rush over to the window expecting to witness some unfolding calamity but instead hear my son say, "The trees!! They're green again!" And sure enough, as I look from high up, the city is suddenly awash with green, the bare bones of the tree branches having sprouted feverishly until one could barely see the brown. Panfilov Park had gone from being a Winter Wonderland to a Spring Garden Fiesta. The painstakingly dug up and planted patches were beginning to show the first shoots and leaves of tulips and roses. In the Green Market the majority of the hibernating stalls had returned, piled high with fruits and vegetables. The majestic Alatau had all but shed its snowy white cloak exposing the greenbrown landscape underneath. Druzhba

A Uyghur Village Behind Highrises

I don't know how I first noticed that something was different about Druzhba. Maybe it was all the wolves that I saw in windshield decals or the abundance of crescent moons. Maybe it was the dome-shaped samsa cooked streetside in tandyr ovens, or the blue-tipped minarets of the mosque behind the stands. Or maybe it was the people I encountered, like the white-bearded men sitting on handcrafted benches outside their homes, their heads bedecked in skullcaps. It wasn't until I told local friends where I was walking that I learned what Druzhba was known for: "Oh, that's a Uyghur neighborhood," they said, giving the word Uyghur a certain strange intonation to accent its otherness. Ah, Uyghur. I had travelled amongst these Turkic-speaking Muslim people in Western China earlier this year, and I had grown fond of their shreddy music and natural ebullience. I went back to Druzhba two more times, now armed with this crucial context, trying to connect the dots between those moons and wolves, to try to grasp what that phrase "Uyghur neighborhood" should even mean.

"No, it's not a Uyghur neighborhood," one woman named Gulraushan told me emphatically. "It's called 'Druzhba,' after all." Druzhba [Дружба] means "Friendship" in Russian, as in "Friendship of the Peoples," and she went on to say that these days this region in western Almaty was quite diverse. Yet she also admitted that there were several different generations of Uyghurs just on her street, some like her whose relatives came decades ago and speak "clean" Russian, and still others who are more recent arrivals from China and send their kids to the Uyghur language school nearby. She came from a Soviet age where all "peoples" should be melded into a homogenous Sovietman, and so when she told me she was Uyghur, she said it offhandedly, like she was nervous about revealing any national pride.

Gulraushan was probably right to downplay the "ethnic enclave" angle, anyways. Sure, there were those little visual clues I had first picked up on, the Muslim and Turkic imagery and so on, but many other differences were domestic and indoors, like the languages spoken inside these homes or the backgrounds on their family photos. Mostly the streetscape was anonymous and familiar; homes had the same maroon tin roofs I've seen elsewhere, the same plaster diamonds, the wooden filigree. The differences, like the shoddy benches running along the fences, could be easily overlooked if you weren't vigilant. Yet I was sensitive to these things, always looking for a way to distinguish one place from another. After walking in so many corners of the city, that's what I hungered for: some way to keep every place distinct in my mental travelogue. So for me, Druzhba became a Uyghur village, and in my mind I branded it so convincingly that I might as well have called it "Little Kashgar" and put up a kitschy gateway arch.

Maybe it was that "village" part that also got me set on Druzhba's otherness. After all, it never even used to be part of Almaty. Talking to some other men down the street from Gulraushan, I learned that it was once upon a time a collective farm called, in that herky-jerky Russian way, "The Collective Farm Named After Stalin," and they could remember when there used to be stables where giant gas pipes now stand, and when the highrises next door were just corn fields. As those microdistricts sprouted to the east, it became Druzhba, and it became Dostyk as private landownership blew up in the independence period and big homes started to hedge in the former farm from the west. Yes, it was now officially called Dostyk, the Kazakh translation of Druzhba, "friendship," but nobody seemed to use the word so I won't either. Calling it "Stalin" would be just a little too nostalgic, so Druzhba it has stayed. Just as the old name has stuck, so has its old reputation. Though it had been surrounded and become a suburb, it is still a village in the imagination of Almatians

TRAVEL India with kids

Discovering India and the maharadja's country was always a dream ! And being at only 3 hours and half by plane, only thirty minutes... of time difference, we couldn't resist !!

So we planned in September 2 trips :

- One trip in October to discover Rajasthan and Agra
- One trip in December to relax in Goa and visit Delhi

1 - Rajasthan :

We spent time in India from a Friday to Sunday to visit : Jodhpur, Udaipur, Jaipur, Ranthambore National Park and Agra (Taj Mahal). It was a very very busy trip, organized by a french travel agency.

We are not used to travelling with a tourist tour, but with kids (and 4 kids from 9YO to 2YO), it is really mandatory : have a driver + a car + a guide who will help you with all the entrances of palaces and also the « safe restaurants ». Some people could say that we should skip one city, but it is really a pity not to visit in a same trip the pink city (Jaipur), the blue city (Jodhpur) and the white city (Udaipur). It was very nice with kids to explore also the Ranthambore National Park and see tigers. And I think you couldn't go to India without seing the Taj Mahal !!

All our visits was feerics. Because most of the visit are more outside than inside, it was nice to visit with kids, specially for example in Jaipur where you HAVE TO ride elephant to enter into the Amber Fort !! But dont expect coming back relaxed, you will come back over exhausted !!

But if you have only 10 days, no choice, and it's worth it ! for sure !!

If you go there with young girls, you will find indian princess clothes and bracelets and hennea, and they will be in paradise !!







2 - Goa and Delhi :

In December, we wanted to come back to India (because so convenient and cheap flight tickets), we wanted sun, relax, a little bit culture and the sea !! Goa was the perfect place : no clouds during five days, coconut trees everywhere, and the first catholic churches in Asia.

But beaches was not as expected !!! Anyway, spending time in swimming pool with kids in front of the ricefield with some slow buffalos, and then visiting the old portuguese neighbourhood, or the old white churches on the sunset was a great relaxing program ! We also spent 3 days in Delhi to visit the Humayun tomb, the Qutub Minar, a sikh temple, and the spice market in Old Delhi.

This time in India, we was without guides and without tour, and it was nice to do it in our rythm, specially with kids.









Some tips :

-NOBODY WAS SICK !! I know it is incredible, specially with four kids, and two small ones who can touch everything and put everything in the mouth !!

We was more carefull than usual when we travel :

I took dozen of sanitharized soap, wet anti-bacteriological tissu, and also javellized wet tissue (for toilets if not very clean) !!

I took 3 or 4 kg of medicine anti-diarrhea for adult and for kids + to cure, antiseptique spray, roll on of Arnica, and I took the hypothesis of everybody would be sick during 5 days at least !! Also paracetamol, nurofen for adult and for kids. And I came back home without using any medicine !! Of course, we cleaned the hands as much as possible, I cleaned the seat belts in the plane, and eveything what a kid can touch. We cleaned some tables in a restaurant or some toilets.... But we was not « maniac » either !! and we didn't go to hospital because my daughter drunk the water of fontain in the garden of the hotel !!!

-FOOD and WATER : In Rajasthan we was with a guide who knows where we can eat safe, we didn't buy anything in the street except cookies or chips. We took water only in hotel, and be careful that the bottle was well closed. thought having a small diet in Indian in being sick and in fact I came back with 2 kg more (the cheese nan and the butter masala are very good but quite heavy food !!). In december without guide, we have preferred staying in the hotel, or check in the Lonely planet. It is true that we didn't try anything in the street (compare to Thailande or the other countries in Asia, where you can try everything). For the kids, I took some fruits compots from here, cookies and candies for some snacks, and one babyfood per day for my last one to be sure to have at least one meal ! But in India you have rice and chicken and it is not too spicy !! In the hotel (not luxurious hotel, but not budget hotel also), we eat fruits and vegetables, what it as not recommended, but without any problems !

-Clothes : in opposite of Asia (where we are used to travelling a lot), I felt inconfortable to wear short and short skirt, specially in Rajasthan, I was happy to buy (also because I love shopping !!) traditional pant and kurta with beautiful colors, nice coton, and very nice also with a white jeans !! In Goa, I felt less inconfortable, it is more relax !!

-With kids : in Rajasthan it is very crowded, you should hold the hands of your kids, mandatory on the street, it is more relax inside palace or temple (except Taj Mahal !!).

To conclude : if you want exotism closed to Almaty, fly to India, and dont be afraid to go there with kids, they will love it also !!

And we will come back in India beginning of may for Keralaand Pondicherry !!!

TRAVEL Harrogate - North Yorkshire

Every Christmas for the past 7 years we have headed back to the UK to celebrate with my husband's family. We chose to take a small stay-cation in this period, to get away and have some time on our own. The past few years we have chosen North yorkshire - it's close to Manchester where we are based so only 1-1.5 hours to drive and there is plenty and nothing to do - depending on your mood. This Christmas we stayed in a great house from Airbnb, in central Harrogate. A beautiful Victorian English town, that has the perfect blend of old and new.

History - The Harrogate name can be found as far back as 1332 according to surviving documentary evidence. By 1399 Harrogate became Royal property when the possessions of the Duchy of Lancaster merged with the English Royal Crown.

Harrogate sprang from two hamlets, only known for their relation to the historic town of Knaresborough. William Slingsby discovered the first Harrogate mineral well in 1571. Believing it to possess the same qualities as spa water, Tewit Well was likened to Belgium spa waters and was said to have health properties. Dr Bright dubbed Harrogate "The English Spa" in 1596.

By 1660, the town of Harrogate was expanding rapidly. Public bathing houses soon sprang up around the town. Doctors wrote about Harrogate waters and their health benefits, driving more people to seek medical cures in the town. People came from far and wide to bathe and drink the waters.

Already well-established as a spa town, The Enclosure Act for the Forest of Knaresborough saw the protection of 200 acres of land, including the springs and The Stray parkland visitors came for the waters and enjoyed countless walks through the parks which was a breath of fresh air compared to inner city smog.

Between 1830 and 1841, local businessmen and hoteliers tried to profit from the wells by siphoning the precious waters into their own wells for visitors. As a result of this vandalism, locals petitioned for an Act of Parliament to protect the wells that were so instrumental to the town's survival.

Harrogate - North Yorkshire

n 1897 The Royal Baths was opened to offer spa treatments and hydrotherapy to visitors. Today, the Turkish Baths is all that is left of the working spa. Many similar institutions follower but as 1914 brought the First World War, a decline in spa treatments caused many to suffer.

By the 1940s, Harrogate had reinvented itself as a conference town. The Old Swan Hotel secured the International Toy Fair for the town in the 1960's, cementing Harrogate as a place for business and congregation. Today the town hosts many internationally renowned fairs and meetings at the International Conference Centre.

Towns close by to visit - Ripon (for all you Downton Abbey fans), Knaresborough, Pateley Bridge, Masham, Boroughbridge
